The foreign language placement exam serves to determine whether or not you have already met the College's foreign language requirement on the basis of prior study, what course you should take to complete the requirement if you have not already met it, and what is the most appropriate course for you to take if you have met the requirement but wish to continue your study for foreign language. place into Chemistry 120, they may enroll in Biology 201, Gateway to Cellular and Molecular Biology. *Students with an AP score of 4, or with IB or other advanced placement credits may take the placement exam to determine if they can waive the Biology 200 Foundations course.*

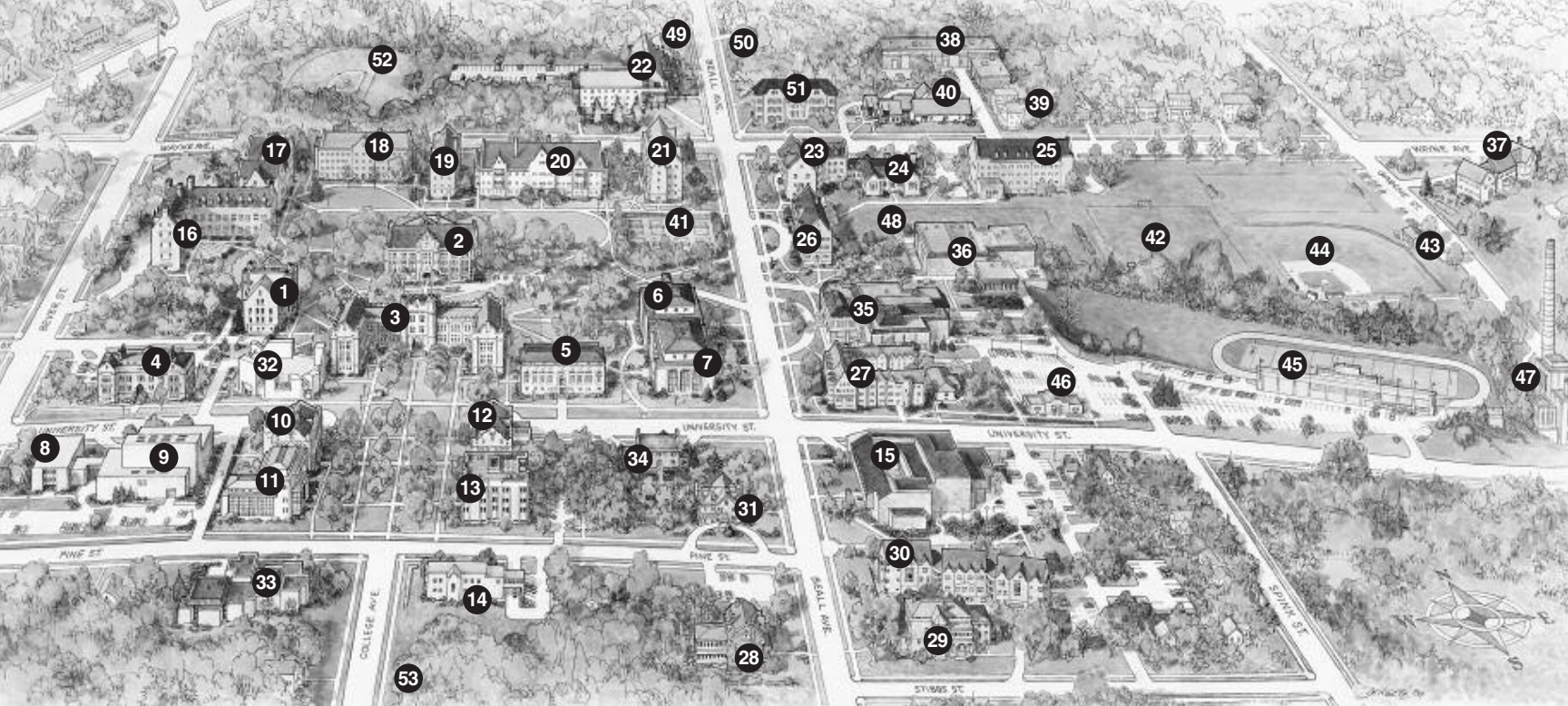


